NATS Winter 2022-2023 Featured Speakers

January 10, 2023: Richard Tehan



Drug discovery and chemical ecology investigations of *Cordyceps* and related fungi

Join NATS for the January 2023 speaker meeting where Dr. Richard Tehan will provide an overview of some of the most potent, transformative drugs derived from the fungal Kingdom. Richard's presentation will highlight the ways in which fungi are uniquely interesting from a chemical perspective. He will also elaborate on current, cutting edge research on bioactive metabolites from insect— and truffle—parasitic fungi.

Richard Tehan received a B.S. in Chemistry from Utica College of Syracuse University and a PhD. in Pharmaceutical Sciences with Kerry McPhail at Oregon State University. His thesis work involved the isolation and structure elucidation of new, bioactive natural products from insect-pathogenic fungi, as well as analyses to investigate the evolution and chemical ecology of natural product families. His ongoing research also includes taxonomic studies of *Cordyceps* and related fungi. Richard aspires to continue in a research career investigating the evolution of this group of fungi, their metabolic diversity, their potential for drug discovery, and the roles specialized metabolites play in their unique ecologies.

Potluck Speakers: Heather & Hilary Rose Dawson w/ live performance by truffle dog extraordinaire, Rye

Wait, don't eat the truffle! Adventures in truffle dog training and life with a "diversity dog"



Truffle dogs are gaining popularity in the Pacific Northwest because they find the highest quality culinary truffles - and it's a fun activity to do with your dog. What happens when a dog doesn't stop truffling? Turns out some dogs are great at finding unusual non-culinary truffles everywhere. Learn about truffle dog training and some of the cool truffles we didn't expect to find in the western Cascades and Willamette Valley.

Heather and Hilary Rose Dawson are sisters who have been truffling with dogs since 2019. Heather graduated with her Bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon in 2020 and works as a mycological technician in Bitty Roy's lab at UO. Hilary Rose is a Biology PhD student in the Soil Plant Atmosphere Lab at UO. Their star golden retriever, Rye, is a truffle dog genius who finds a large diversity of underground odiferous fungi whenever he's in the woods. In this talk, they will share their experiences with a truffle dog who does not focus on culinary species, the common and uncommon non-culinary truffles they've found, and give a live demonstration of a truffle dog in action.

NATS Winter 2023 Featured Speakers, con't March 7, 2023: Dr. Jessie Uehling

Mycological diversity and ethnobotanical history of psilocybin.

In 2020, Oregon voters approved a ballot measure to allow use of psilocybin (the hallucinogenic compound found in some mushrooms) in therapeutic settings. Preliminary data show psilocybin has potential to address mental health issues such as depression, anxiety, and PTSD. Dr. Uehling is the mycologist for Oregon's Psilocybin Advisory Board, which was created to research how to roll out a safe and equitable system for psilocybin use. Jessie will discuss mycological diversity and the ethnobotanical history of psilocybin use, as well as the clinical trial data on the efficacy of psilocybin as therapy.



Dr. Jessie Uehling is a mycology professor at Oregon State University in the Department of Botany and Plant Pathology. At OSU she runs a research lab, curates the fungal herbarium collection, teaches, serves as a governmental policy advisor, and provides outreach and education to the community. She is passionate about fungal diversity, education, and mental health.

Oregon Truffle Festival

The Oregon Truffle Festival (OTF) is back! Bringing together artisan food producers, chefs, speakers, industry experts, truffle growers, and an ever-growing community of truffle fans, the OTF highlights time and time again that beautiful wine country of Oregon's Willamette Valley is the premier destination for all things truffle in North America.

OTF has worked tirelessly over the past fifteen years to educate farmers, land owners, harvesters, truffle dog trainers, chefs, and consumers about every aspect of native truffles and truffle cultivation, while furthering the mycological research that began over 100 years ago at Oregon State University.

The festival has also sought to keep events accessible, with tickets to the marketplace starting at \$15 per person. NATS will hold a table at the venue marketplace and those tables need to be manned. Additionally, NATS members may volunteer to help work the Truffle Festival admissions table, check ID at the door for wine tasting, and more. Shifts are in four-hour increments, either 9-1 or 1-5, after which they gain free entry to enjoy the marketplace when off shift!

Don't forget the FunDiS West Coast Rare Fungi Challenge continues!! October 2020 - March 2025

FunDiS is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to a world in which the fungal kingdom is fully documented, understood, appreciated and protected. With just under 10% of fungal species documented and impending threats of habitat loss, pollution, and climate change, the need to catalogue and map fungal species before they expire is acute.

FunDiS strives to increase scientific knowledge and public awareness of the critical role of fungi in the health of our ecosystems and to better utilize and protect them. We do this by equipping community scientists, working with professionals, with the tools to document the diversity and distribution of fungi across North America. There are 3 primary FunDiS programs: improved diversity databases; rare fungi challenges; community science projects.

The Return of Todd Elliott

NATS was fortunate to have a surprise speaker in December, as Todd Elliott was in town to visit his friend and mentor - Dr. Jim Trappe, NATS's very own scientific advisor! The meeting was held at the Corvallis Public Library, as well as aired via Zoom. Todd's talk was titled:

Vertebrate Mycophagy: the role of animals in spore dispersal around the world

Todd shared his recent research into these interactions and described what is known about the ecological importance of these fascinating interconnected associations around the world. Mammals, reptiles, and birds contribute to the dispersal of truffles and many different fungi through the consumption of fruiting bodies.

Todd Elliott is a biologist, naturalist, and mycologist. His work in global biodiversity and interrelationships in nature has taken him to remote corners of six continents to study the biodiversity and ecology of fungi. Most recently, he has been conducting research in Australia for his PhD on the role vertebrates play in the dispersal of fungi (truffles in particular). Todd is an author of the **Timber Press field guide Mushrooms of the Southeast** and has discovered and described species of mushrooms new to science.

NATS iNaturalist Submission Process

If you have a specimen that you think should be accessioned, be sure to dry the truffles to prevent rot (see https://fundis.org/sequence/collect-dry/dry-your-specimens), and please email NATrufflingSociety@gmail.com to learn if we can accept your specimens.

Additional information fields are provided to record your observations on iNaturalist. Such information is often crucial for specimen identification, so if possible, please include:

Collector's (real) name for the specimen label

Elevation*

Slope*

Overstory/understory trees & shrubs (scientific name preferred)

Substrate (moss, mineral soil, soil, wood, or litter)

Fresh notes such as colors and odor (using the notes section on iNaturalist)


*Estimates of these data are acceptable, however, **PLEASE** denote such instances.

UNIDENTIFIED TRUFFLE?

What to do?

Visit www.natruffling.org for a printable field data card (hand-written submissions on awesome stationary certainly welcome). Please provide a description of significant characteristics of the habitat immediately surrounding the collection site, including the dominant trees and other vegetation species and slope/exposure. Also include site coordinates (GPS data, if available) and, when possible, color digital images showing a surface view and an interior section, cut top-to-bottom, through the center of the truffle.

Prior to submission, gently remove loose soil from the specimen. DO NOT scrub briskly or use a stiff brush; an intact outer skin is important for identification. Dry thoroughly using a food dehydrator OR by refrigerating samples in a loosely closed paper bag for a couple days. For faster drying, cut truffles in half to reduce moisture trapped by the outer skin.
